Leaders Assure Smith Of Victory In Illinois

IOWA AROUSES NOMINEE FROM SLEEP BY SINGING "CORN SONG" AT CLINTON

Chicago, Sept. 18.—Presenting a
"silly picture" from the Democratic
standpoint of the political trend in
the normally Republican State of
Illinois, a group of party leaders
assured Governor Smith in Chicago
Monday night that he would carry
the State, perhaps with a majority
in excess of 100,000.

This estimate was given the Presi-
dential nominee by Thomas Donavan,
Democratic National Committeeman
and chairman of the party's State
Committee. Six other supporters of
the New York Governor accompanied
Donavan and rode with him and the
nominee through a network of rail-
road tracks to the west side of the
city, where the train was turned over
by the New York Central to the
Chicago & Northwestern for the
overnight run to Omaha. In the
Nebraska City, Governor Smith is to
deliver his first campaign speech to-
night, with the farm problem as his
theme.

Senator Wagner, of New York,
political ally of Governor Smith,
also traveled through the yards with
his friend. Wagner told the Govern-
or he had been in Wisconsin for a
week doing organization work and
assured him that State, carried in
1924 by LaFollette, was "in the
bag" for him. He said there was no
cause whatever to worry about the
Badger State.

Governor Smith, who is at home in
a crowd shook hands with dozens of
admirers who clamored upon the
rear platform of his train.

Smith had to interrupt his sleep
as his train entered Iowa, when
several thousand persons at Clinton
insisted on his appearing. The crowd
burst forth with the "Iowa Corn
Song" in such volume that the Presi-
dential nominee finally was forced
to appear—with his brown derby and
with an overcoat thrown over his
night clothing. While the crowd
howled its approval, Smith shook
hands with those who could crowd
near enough and exchanged greet-
ings.

Flying Not Cure For Deafness Says Air Surgeon

Washington, Sept. 18.—The wide-
spread impression that airplane
flights tend to cure deafness was
characterized today by Lieut. Col.
Levy M. Hathaway, flight surgeon of
the army air corps, as "quite erro-
neous and contrary to the actual facts."
The flight surgeon said that flying
"caused and aggravated" deafness.

"It seems unfortunate," declared
Colonel Hathaway, "that the general
public should believe that altitude
flights and air maneuvers are benefi-
cial for deafness, since such measures
are useless in that connection and
may even prove harmful."

"Defective hearing is common
among aviators and is generally con-
sidered occupational. Many fliers are
slightly deaf, though not noticeably
so, except when tested for hearing.

The roar of a 400 horse power engine
is terrific. This noise, together with
the rapidly changing atmospheric
pressure on the delicate structures of
the auditory apparatus, soon dulls the
sense of hearing."
