MAN KILLED ON MUNICIPAL SPAN BY AUTOMOBILE

Victim Steps In Path Of Salesman's Car

The first traffic fatality on the Municipal Bridge since the structure was erected occurred Wednesday night, at 10:23 o'clock, when Adrian P. Skinner, of 800 South Second Street, Louisville, succumbed at the Louisville City Hospital, four hours after he had been hit by an automobile.

Skinner suffered fractures of the right arm, both legs and the pelvis and a possible fracture of the skull internal injuries and severe body cuts.

H. M. Moeller, 45, a salesman of Terre Haute, Indiana, driver of the car, stated that Skinner appeared ahead of his motor so suddenly it seemed he might have deliberately jumped into the path. He was crossing the bridge toward Jeffersonville.

"I was driving only about thirty miles an hour, going north," Moeller said. "He appeared out of a black spot—a shadow on the driveway; evidently coming from the walkway on the west side of the bridge. Only one other automobile was on the bridge and it was behind me."

Moeller was held on a technical charge, pending completion of investigation by police officials.

Plane Victim Is Reported Better

James Wiley Suffers Severe Hand Injuries

James Wiley, 62, of 217 E. Chestnut Street, who suffered severe injuries to his right hand when it was struck by an airplane propeller, was reported today as improving at the Clark County Memorial Hospital.

Besides having a compound fracture of his arm, Mr. Wiley was forced to submit to the amputation of the fingers on the hand. Only a stub of the thumb and index finger remain.

The accident occurred last Saturday on Mr. Wiley's farm, in the Township, near the Union Church. He had been cleaning the engine of his airplane, and was cranking it to test the work. The cylinders fired sooner than anticipated, catching the victim between the plane and a fence. It was stated that the fence, stopping the propeller, probably saved Mr. Wiley's life.

Auto Swerves Against Telephone Pole

Robert Brocklehurst, of Charlestown suffered severe internal injuries and John Nix, of New Albany, suffered a compound fracture of the right forearm and injuries to his shoulder, as the two students, who were hanging on the sides of an automobile were thrown against a telephone pole as the machine swerved, at Hanover, Indiana.

The car, driven by Kendall Ashley, of Gary, swerved to miss hitting another car, it was reported. Walter Hassfurd, of Madison, and Robert Henning, of Hanover, also riding with Ashley were cut slightly by glass.

W. P. A. DROPS ALIENS FROM WORKING STAFF

New Regulations Are Cause Of Action

Purging of aliens by the Indiana Works Progress Administration continues as rapidly as they are ferreted out, it was announced.

By October 15 its rolls will be entirely free of persons who are not citizens of the United States or persons who have not filed declarations of becoming citizens, John E. Jennings, WPA Administrator, stated at Indianapolis.

Already, Jennings said, 414 aliens have been removed from the rolls and 122 others are to be dropped.

The action is being taken, he explained, in accordance with revised regulations, which became effective in July.

The regulations, he said, provide that preference be given to World War and Spanish-American war veterans and United States citizens, providing such persons are qualified by training, experience and ability for the work to be performed.

Announcement also was made that Indiana was well within the limit of enrollees permitted under recent regulations. Figures show that since the week ended September 28, 1936, WPA payrolls have dropped from 67,467 names to 41,436.

GOVERNOR ENDS PRISONERS IN INSTITUTIONS

Officials Given Warrant

Governor M. Caffery issued orders to State officials to discontinue the practice of giving warrants and sentences of prison to persons convicted of crimes, the sentences of which are less than one year, and they were convicted.

The Governor's decision is an opinion of the State's Attorney General, holding that the practice is unconstitutional.

The order will affect 300 prisoners in at Michigan City and at Pendleton.
