Barrackman Trial, New Albany, Set For March 21

The trial of Mrs. Rena Barrackman, former resident of Jeffersonville and corset saleswoman, charged with the murder of her husband, Lew J. Barrackman at their home on North Spring street, on the afternoon of July 4, is set for trial in the Floyd Circuit Court, New Albany, on Thursday, March 21, according to reports today.

The case, sent to Floyd County on a change of venue, was originally set for trial during the January term, however, the case was reassigned because of the illness of Prosecuting Attorney Walter E. Prentice.

Mrs. Barrackman after being returned to Jeffersonville from St. Joseph, Missouri, upon an indictment from the Clark County Grand jury, was later released from jail in New Albany upon a bond of \$3,000. The bond was executed through the defendant who was held on a charge of murder, because of the evidence being circumstantial it has been explained.

Barrackman, who was a carpenter, was murdered sometime on the afternoon of July 4, at his Spring street home in Jeffersonville. Neighbors present on a nearby porch, stated they failed to hear shots, that were reported to have caused his death, according to reports of Police and Coroner Asa D. Combs. The wife, who testified at a number of hearings, set out she had attended a celebration at Glenwood Park, New Albany, and her husband was at home when she left. Upon return, she alleges that she found the body of her husband on a bed in their home. She has denied any knowledge of the murder, since the first hearing on the afternoon of his death.

Rotary President Shows Reasons For Vatican's Ruling

Chicago—An open letter relating his negotiations at Rome, which culminated in the lifting of the Vatican's ban on Catholic membership in Rotary International, has been issued by I. B. Sutton, international president.

Mr. Sutton said he pointed out to church authorities "that Rotary is primarily a business and professional men's organization whose purpose is to promote higher standards of business practice, understanding good will and peace throughout the world." Eight other points he stressed in his statements were:

Rotary has no connection with Masonry or any other organization.
 Religious and political discussions are positively forbidden.
 Rotary has no record of the religious faith of its members.
 Rotary has no vows or secrets and all its activities and records are public.

Rotary has absolute respect for the religious faith of all its members.

Rotary has a code of correct business practices, but does not establish a moral code, nor tend to create any religious sect or religion.

There is nothing in the principles of practices of Rotary contrary to the Catholic dogma.

Catholic Rotarians would cease to belong to Rotary if these rules were not observed.

Loaded Cattle Truck Overturns

Cattle being transferred in a large truck from Sellersburg to the Stock market at Louisville, narrowly escaped an unexpected dip in the Ohio river at 12:35 o'clock Wednesday afternoon when a truck being driven by an employe of the Dold Transfer company at Sellersburg overturned as it rounded a sharp curve onto the west entrance of the apron of the Jeffersonville Ferry dock, according to reports.

The suddenness of the turn, caused seven cows to swerve toward the outer part of the truck and the swerve in the weight of the load turned the truck over onto the side, it was explained. The animals groped about in wonderment, following their sudden release from captivity. The driver, whose name was not learned, was unhurt, and the cattle were reported to have been uninjured. The truck was said to have been slightly damaged.
